### 1. Minutes and Matters Arising

- Members agreed the Minutes from Meetings 1 and 2.
- A number of matters in relation to meeting logistics were discussed.

### 2. Presentation on the Social Insurance System

Inputs: PC0330 Secretariat Presentation on the Social Insurance System PC0331 Secretariat Note on the Social Insurance System

- The Secretariat presented a high-level overview of the structure of the Social insurance system and the Social Insurance Fund's (SIF) Income and Expenditure.
   The presentation noted the primary role of Class A employer and employee PRSI contributions in funding the SIF, and highlighted that Pensions make up the majority of SIF spending by a considerable margin.
- Members discussed a range of issues. The Secretariat was asked to provide further information and clarification on a number of issues.

# 3. Presentation on the Actuarial Review of the Social Insurance Fund

Inputs: PC0340 KPMG's Presentation on the Actuarial Review of the Social Insurance Fund – this is subject to minor edits

PC0341 KPMG (2017) 2015 Actuarial review of the Social Insurance Fund. DSP: Dublin.

- Joanne Roche, Director and Actuary at KPMG, presented key results of the 2015
  review of the SIF (published 2017), including projected shortfalls in the SIF, the
  'break even' rate that contributions would have to be to make up shortfalls assuming
  varying levels of Exchequer subvention. Chapter 7 of the Review has more details
  on core results.
- Contributions relative to social insurance benefits paid out are good value for money for low earners, self -employed and women (when only pensions are taken into account); and for men overall (as they tend to receive other social insurance benefits). The SIF is highly redistributive in this respect. See Chapter 11 for more details on value for money.
- A number of policy options for addressing shortfalls while maintaining the rationale of poverty prevention were considered. See chapter 12 for more details on the impacts of different policy options.
- Sensitivity analyses (different assumptions for e.g. fertility rates, migration, earnings growth, etc) align with the implications of sustainability challenges presented in meeting 3.
- The SIF is reviewed every 5 years. Work on the 2020 review will commence in 2021 but findings will not be ready in time for the Commission's deliberations. Accordingly, the Department has engaged KPMG to carry out a number of specific analyses for the Commission, updating the base case scenario to take account of developments since 2015 (such as the interim TCA, rate changes, and the pension age) and also to determine the impact of various possible policy reforms on the SIF to inform the Commission's deliberations. The Chair asked Members to reflect on other analyses KPMG might conduct and members noted some areas of interest.

# 4. Proposals for the Design and Delivery of a Two-Staged Consultation Process

- The Secretariat gave a short presentation on a proposal for the design and delivery of a two staged consultation process.
- After a short discussion on the proposals, Members approved a two-staged consultation approach. The first stage would be a broad consultation with an advertising campaign. The second stage would be an invited Stakeholder Forum, with a process (to be decided) to select relevant Stage 1 submitters as Stage 2 participants. Members stressed the importance of a robust, transparent and well-designed process. Members noted that the Secretariat would produce a more detailed outline of the first stage of the consultation process by early in the New Year.
