Gender and care

Persistent inequalities in the sharing of care remain

- 94% of those 'looking after home and family' are women (2019)
- Older women 5 times more likely to leave work for care reasons (2019)
- 60-65% of NMW workers are women

Absence of a care ethic in our pensions system

- Male breadwinner model
- Full State Contributory Pension 1 in 3 women
- 63,603 QA's in 2019
- TCA/HomeCaring Periods Scheme
 - 1st Sept 1946
 - Capped at 20 years; 20 years paid contributions

Extending working life

- Impact of extended working lives on those who provide care
- Gender, equality or poverty analysis of increases in age of eligibility for the State Pension?

Towards a pensions system that values care

A universal pension is the best way to ensure unpaid care work is recognised in the pension system

- Addresses historical and current inequalities
- Low coverage
- Income adequacy
- Administratively simpler

Recommendations

 A universal pension for all which would recognise that paid work and unpaid work are equally valuable.

Interim recommendations:

- Individualised access to pensions
- A Homecarers credit that actively recognises the contribution of care and also serves as a re-entry credit.
- Ensure the TCA is limited to 30 years for the max pension and remove
 20 years cap on caring contributions
- Ensure women born before 1st Sept 1946 can benefit from schemes
- Once-off, ring-fenced retrospective scheme for those effected by marriage bar

Gender proof the Commission's work

Crucial that the Commission's proposals and recommendations are assessed for impact on women and results published
