If we plan to tidy up the disposal of used items such as cans & bottles by charging a deposit, then we need to ensure that we have designed and implemented a scheme for using the material. Putting it into shipping containers to send overseas to 3rd world countries is not an environmentally viable solution.

If the materials currently used to manufacture containers do not lend themselves to efficient recycling then they should be banned in favour of materials that are suitable. For example waxed cardboard containers can (worse case) be burned in a non-toxic manner where as many plastics are toxic. There is no point in building a "mini-economy" around the exchange of containers that are ultimately useless.

Big business will protest, but if they can't comply at a cost that they are willing to absorb, then it opens the door for small innovative industry to fill the gap.
