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

Yes. But note that Circular Economy aligns with the CEAP/Climate Change and avoid unintended consequence(s). I Do you agree with the overall level of ambition set out in the draft Strategy? Yes. Note - Ireland should at least align with EU counterparts on goals and ambitions. However, there are countries (less developed than Ireland) that are achieving greater progress as they require improved levels of upcycling and re-use in their products compared to Ireland at present. Refer to the Ellen Mac Arthur Foundation and numerous projects globally, it would be advisable to invest in personnel to constantly review this ever changing area for best practise examples which might apply to Irish secondary raw materials generated.
