2 What additional actions do you think would be effective in helping Ireland reduce its food waste? Response:

From reading the draft Roadmap, there doesn't seem to be enough emphasis placed on communities.

- 1. Existing community structures span the key sectors outlined in the document and would provide a means to tie actions in the different sectors together.
- 2. Certain loose communities, where people share resources and facilities but may not know each other, can build tighter bonds through circular economy actions apartment blocks for example.
- 3. These types of communities bridge the reporting and monitoring gap that exist between households and municipalities. Apartment blocks have clearly defined waste collection measures and no composting unless part of a community scheme. They also have a clear localised impact on the food retail and restaurant sector.
- 4. The facts that: a) food waste collection is so poorly managed at present in apartments; and, b) communication and accountability issues due to short-term tenancies would seem to suggest that Common Pool Resource Management strategies are a real way to make a measurable impact.
