# Rome, Italy

- almost 3m inhabitants
- 20 m visits every year

#### Waste problem

- 1.7 million metric tons rubbish every year
- · 2 treatment plants closed in 2013 and 2018.
- Plastic problem: Italy largest producer of plastic goods and the 2nd largest waste generator in the region.

#### Transport problem:

- •Between 2016 and 2019, more than 30 buses burn
- •By 2018, Rome was expending €7.4 per kilometre of transit travel. €2.8 is considered European best practice
- Public transport administrated by ATAC, a councilowned Transport Company with €1.4bn debt and bad reputation.
- 2018 referendum to privatize the service




#### Mayor Virginia Raggi

- First woman occupying the role
- Won with 67% of the votes
- Support public administration of services (transport and waste management)

#### MoVimento 5 Stelle

- 5 pillars: public water, sustainable mobility, development, connectivity and the environment.

1 Installing PET collection machines in Rome's metro stations

PET PLASTIC BOTTLES DEPOSIT

Citizens could deposit their PET plastic bottles (from 0.5 to 2 litres), thus receiving € 0.05 in credit for each one

The accumulated "Eco bonus" can be exchanged by transport tickets that have a cost of € 1.50. (30 bottles)

4 PET bottles are reinserted in the production process.
New plastic products in RPET (recycled PET)



#### + RECICLI + VIAGGI

#### Results after 8 month of scheme

- 3.200.000 PET bottles were recycled
- equivalent to 160.000 euros= 106.666 transport tickets



#### The need for such a scheme in Dublin

- Serious litter problem in parts of Dublin City
- Dublin City Council incur high costs for waste management/litter picking
- Ireland is currently behind on a range of EU recycling and waste management targets
- Public Transport will need a boost post-pandemic








#### **Past and Present Debate**

- Deposit and return scheme has been debated in Ireland for many years at a national level
- Primary issue has been operating costs and costs to consumers/existing waste companies
- Questions also asked of whether its required and the likely impact it would have
- Has faced opposition from Repak, IBEC and IWMA
- Politically it has been supported primarliy by the Greens
- Appears to be support from general public 2





#### **Proposed Deposit & Return Scheme**

- Currently being drafted and has been subject to public consultation
- 3 potential models of implementation; Centralised, Decentralised or a Hybrid
- Will involve reclamation of a deposit (€0.20) that will be paid on drinks containers



# Obstacles to Implementation

#### Overcoming Obstacles



- Could conflict with the proposed deposit and return scheme under the Waste Action Plan
- Opposition from relevant bodies & national government
- Who would be the driver of the policy range of potential bodies would need to work together
- Implementation costs
- Could be piloted by Dublin City Council, Repak and Irish Rail or other PT provider
- Could compliment a universal deposit return scheme in Ireland
- A higher incentive to retrieve PT tickets (i.e. 20c in cash, 30c towards PT ticket)










# Examples of Deposit Return Machines

- The implementation of a reward system for deposit-based recycling can best be facilitated in Dublin via the platform of the existing integrated ticketing system known as LEAP.
- The upcoming reforms to the LEAP card via the Bus Connects programme of investment will see new measures such as 90-minute fares for ease of transition between transport modes.
- It is possible by utilising similar technology that a reward system for the recycling of appropriate waste could be linked to a mixture of transport modes within the Greater Dublin Area.
- The deposit return could be transferred as a discount towards normal ticketing and rental periods for schemes such as bike share or e-scooters.

 This can also reduce waste and littering surrounding public transport infrastructure by working with the waste management policies of assorted stakeholders.
